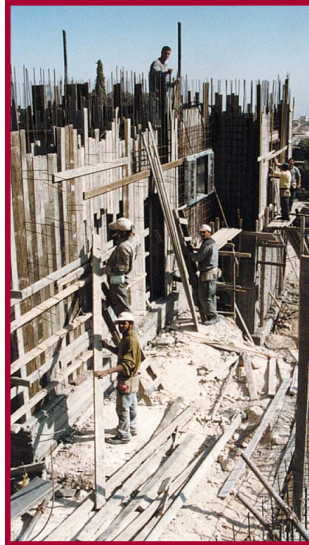

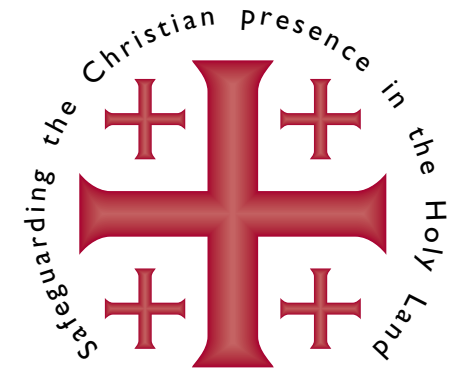

The Franciscan Vision

The mission of the Franciscan Foundation is quite simple... Love God and be of service to the poor and needy. It was the Seraphic Father, St. Francis of Assisi who admonished his friars to always follow those two precepts. St. Francis himself never wavered, never waned in this resolve and today, some 800 years later, the Franciscans remain steadfast with faith and commitment in the face of old and new challenges. They continue to strive to fulfill that mission of love and service particularly to the Christians in the Holy Land.

This mission is being fulfilled in the directive that was given by Pope Clement VI who in 1342, mandated the Franciscans to become the official custodians of the Holy Sites of Christendom, that is, to help maintain and preserve them while at the same time, ministering to the faithful of the Holy Land.

Fr. Pizzaballa, Custos of the Holy Land, stated that it was "through the Incarnation that Christ took on our human form and lived among us here in the Holy Land. We friars who minister in this land have been given an example. We have become witnesses for Him in the very place which Christ made holy. It is by assisting and helping our fellow man in this land and from these Holy Places that we ourselves become incarnate in Him."

Today the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Land is a constant in the life of the Christian community. The friars are obliged to give that peace, that love, that pardon, that faith, and that hope to suffering Christians in the Holy Land who now find themselves in a great dilemma and are reluctantly leaving their homes and land to live in other parts of the world. As Archbishop Sambi recently stated, "We don't want the Holy Sites of Christendom to become empty religious monuments and museums. We need a living and worshipping community.

Our Spiritual Homeland At Risk

The Holy Land has always been an area of conflict and most notably between the Arab and Jewish people living here. It has been a problem of antiquity going back to Abraham's time, when Abraham exiled his second son, Ishmael, in favor of Isaac. For most Arab historians, Ishmael is the father of the Arab nation while Isaac belonged to the Israelites. Since that time, an initial hostility has turned into an ongoing enmity of two people claiming the same land.

Since the UN partition of Palestine in 1947, the control of this land has undergone many changes especially territorial between Israelis and Palestinians. The Wall and other restrictions have affected hundreds of thousands of Palestinians from the West Bank and Gaza, preventing them from going to their work, their schools, and in many cases, from receiving medical care. Much suffering has ensued for both sides. In the middle of this conflict, one small minority is heading towards extinction: the Christians. Due to economic and political factors that they face daily, many Christians are emigrating. In the Diocese of Jerusalem, the Holy Land Christians number 115,000 inside the state of Israel and 35,000 Palestinian Christians in the West Bank and Gaza. In 1940, there were 45,000 Christians living in Jerusalem; today, there are less than 10,000. Christians now comprise less than 2% of the population of the Holy Land. Although there are numerous factions on both sides who carry on the 'cycle of violence,' the vast majority of Christians simply want to live in peace. They are caught up in the middle, wedged between the hammer and the anvil, so to speak.

Jerusalem is the faith-point of every Christian believer - the spiritual hometown of us all. Our Catholic heritage links us through faith and fellowship with all our brothers and sisters in the Holy Land. As pilgrims on a journey to our "promised land," we are beckoned to sustain this Christian community with love, faith, pardon, peace and hope. We are invited to witness to the Light of Christ here as the Franciscans have done for more than 800 years.

Activities of the Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land

The founding Custos of the FFHL, Bishop Giuseppe Nazzaro, OFM, DD, explained, "Just as the Good Friday collection was implemented by the Papacy hundreds of years ago to specifically help to maintain and preserve the Holy Sites and Sanctuaries of Christendom and its institutions, so the Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land (FFHL) was created as yet another Franciscan response to a 'new crisis,' i.e., the Christian exodus from the Holy Land. Our focus is to keep a Christian presence, the 'Living Stones' of our Christian faith, in the Holy Land by providing education, employment, and housing."



University Scholarships

Since 1997 the Foundation has given over \$1.6 million in scholarship grants to Christian students. In turn, each of these young marginalized Christian students agrees to remain in the Holy Land for at least 4 years after graduation. Once students secure employment, they are more inclined to remain in their homeland.

Child Sponsorship Program

Grants are given to Christian children who come from families who cannot afford a Catholic education. Franciscan schools give religious instruction for every student according to his particular religious convictions recognizing the right of each individual to maintain his own faith. Many of our donors sponsor a high school or elementary school child and pay for their yearly tuition. The separation barrier between Israel and the West Bank has cut off jobs and hence many of our Christian families cannot pay for their education. They need our help!



Subsidized Housing/Renovations

To motivate Christians to remain in the Holy Land, the Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land established the "Housing Development Program" to provide subsidized housing to Christian families who would otherwise be forced to reside abroad. Currently, the Franciscan Custody, with the assistance of the FFHL, has already completed over 100 units in Bethlehem and is planning to build another 120 units on the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem and 220 more apartment units in Nazareth and Jaffa. In addition, hundreds of our Christian homes, especially in Bethlehem and Jerusalem, are in dire need of repair or renovation. The Foundation continues to employ Christian engineers, architects and tradesmen to meet these needs.

Employment Opportunities

Many Palestinians from the West Bank and Gaza, who normally held jobs in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa, have been barred indefinitely from entering Israel proper to earn a living. Over the last 5 years, thousands of foreign workers have been hired, replacing Palestinians who previously held these jobs. The average rate of unemployment of Palestinian men as of January 2010 is 65%. The Foundation is endeavoring to create new positions in administration, clerical and custodial positions in our schools, churches, parish centers and medical facilities. Furthermore, new jobs are created in construction trades as we build new housing developments.
