THE EXTRAORDINARY IN THE ORDINARY... AND PERFECT JOY

t. Francis of Assisi teaches his companion Brother Leo about *perfect joy...*returning to the friary on a cold, dark, winter's night, tired and dirty, only to be greeted by a brother who does not recognize them, accuses them of being imposters, even robbers, then sends them away without food or a warm place to sleep...for the saint from Assisi, probably the most recognized saint in the world today, this is *perfect joy*.

The conflict in the Holy Land continues amid hopes and false hopes that hostages will all be released, that the bombing raids will end, that rebuilding can begin, that families can return to some semblance of "home." We know that this hope is not being realized...not yet. While people are trying to create some sense of normalcy in their lives, the overall atmosphere in Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Gaza and other places is anything but normal.

In December, I made my first visit to Jerusalem as President of the Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land, an opportunity to step into what just cannot be normal. I found a quiet, empty Old City, with holy places absent of the customary crowds of pilgrims. To get acquainted with the place and the mission of the foundation, I walked the empty streets, spoke with locals, engaged some of the merchants who are mourning the lack of visitors, and spoke with a number of friars who have dedicated their lives to sustaining the Christian presence in the Holy Land.

One of the friars invited me to join him for a mass at the Holy Sepulcher, the tomb of Jesus, at 5 a.m. on a Saturday morning. I've been a priest for over 35 years and have celebrated mass all over the world – in small and large parishes, school gymnasiums, in some of the most magnificent basilicas and cathedrals, convent chapels, caves outside of Assisi, on mountain tops, and in peoples' homes. But this was different. The tomb – the tomb of Jesus Christ. The brother invited me to be the principal celebrant. We made our way to the Holy Sepulcher very early in the morning and found a shrine deserted. When it was time, he and I entered the very small tomb area, and were joined by about a dozen other worshippers in an outer room to the tomb area, most of whom were religious sisters. The mass was simple, solemn and truly extraordinary.

So, what is *perfect joy*? Is it living amid suffering, loss, displacement? Is it being "safe" in our homes from the suffering of peoples in other parts of the world? Is it stepping into a deserted basilica to celebrate the Holy Eucharist with a small number of faithful? *Perfect joy* is living the ordinary and familiar, embracing the unexpected whether pleasant or unpleasant, and there in the ordinary, knowing that God is present and His love for all is extraordinary.

For the Christians and non-Christians in the Holy Land, the upheaval brought by conflict has sadly become the ordinary. We, the supporters and collaborators of the mission of the Foundation have the opportunity to bring God's extraordinary love and mercy to their ordinary — this is *perfect joy*, is it not?

of the war in the Holy Land, the situation local Christians face and the mission of the Custody to preserve sacred shrines. Below is a brief summary:


I celebrated Christmas at Holy Family Parish in Gaza. Despite the situation all around them, the small Christian community in Gaza, both Catholic and Orthodox, continues to have strong faith. They only want to live in peace in the land of their ancestors. The ongoing war in the Holy Land means that pilgrims are not able to visit the region. We take care of about 80 holy places in some 50 different sanctuaries, so it is particularly difficult when there are no pilgrims, because then there is no financial support.

As we enter 2025, my prayer for my fellow Holy Land Christians is that their faith continues to be strong while we wait for peace. Their strength in the face of such daunting adversity is the true testament to their love of the Lord and his promises. To all the Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land supporters, may you have a blessed new year and know that your sacrificial gifts in support of our brothers and sisters in Christ are met with great gratitude.

Several years ago, Rodney and his wife, Dr. Diane Allen, met Fr. Peter Vasko, OFM in the Holy Land and became good friends. Upon learning of the mission and outstanding work of FFHL, they became regular and enthusiastic supporters, leading Rodney to join the Board in June 2024.

They are active in their local Catholic community as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, and as certified Catechists in Religious Education within the community. They serve with foundations to promote ecumenical dialogue in consultation with Vatican committees for that purpose. They also serve at the regional and national level with an ecumenical Christian organization that partners with and supports the Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land, the Custody and the Latin Patriarchate of the Holy Land. Rodney received his Certificate in Franciscan Studies and made his Profession into the OFS after many inspiring interactions with Franciscans in the U.S. and in the Holy Land.

"We searched extensively for ways in which we could assist Christians at risk in the world, but especially in the Holy Land, where our Lord walked, taught, inspired and accomplished the Salvific Plan," says Rodney. "In our searches, there were few organizations that seemed to be as effective as the FFHL in terms of the support they provide. The FFHL association with the Custody of the Holy Land was very important to us as well. On a personal note, these searches and observations helped guide me to my own vocation as a Secular Franciscan, for which I will be forever grateful."

With a firm belief that all are called to serve those in need, Rodney and Diane wanted to find a way to lessen the burdens of the "Living Stones." They decided to designate FFHL in their estate plan by becoming a member of FFHL's Good Shepherd Society as a simple and gratifying way to provide support for many years to come. "It is a duty and privilege to support our brothers and sisters, and we strongly feel that everyone should take advantage of this wonderful opportunity," said Rodney. "When our Father asks one day, 'What did you do for your brothers and sisters?' we hope to reply 'Father, we are still helping to provide for their needs."

Rodney and Diane are particularly drawn to FFHL's education and humanitarian efforts: "We must preserve the Christian heritage in the Holy Land, where it all began. Reducing the exodus of Christians in the Holy Land through scholarships (we have supported a number of these) and assisting with their basic needs is critically important and must continue. If not now, then when? We are very grateful indeed for the opportunity to serve and support FFHL and strongly encourage all who care for our brothers and sisters of the Holy Land to support FFHL, the Custody, and the Latin Patriarchate, with financial support and constant prayers. God loves a cheerful giver (2 Corinthians 9:7), so why not be one?"

THE PROGRAM

Since 1997, FFHL has provided four-year university scholarships to over 700 students who were economically marginalized but had strong academic talent. With specific guidelines to protect your investment, the scholarship program covers up to \$6,000 per year for tuition and books.

Due to severe political and economic hardships, an estimated 300 Christian families leave the Holy Land each year. This steady emigration suggests that one day the Christian community and church may cease to exist in this part of the world. As the Christian population struggles to thrive, oftentimes survive, FFHL uses every available resource to connect Christians with jobs, education, housing and other opportunities.

THE SOLUTION

One of the pillars of FFHL's mission is to support access to education for young people. Without the assistance from generous scholarship donors, these deserving young scholars would have no ability to earn a marketable university degree and obtain a secure job. Over the last 25 years, FFHL has given over \$15 million in both university scholarships and special educational grants to Christian students. The current graduation rate is 94%, and to-date, only one graduate has relocated away from the Holy Land.

THE GOAL

This program provides academic scholarships to talented but underprivileged Christian students with high initiative and a desire to remain in the Holy Land, thus giving them the necessary skills for successful employment and stability needed to thrive.

EDUCATION CHANGES LIVES

The Franciscan Foundation for the Holy Land (FFHL) University Scholarship Program has made a lifelong impact on many students, providing them with the chance to continue their education and remain in the Holy Land.

Every year, nearly 100 deserving students apply for a University Scholarship, far more than FFHL can support. The need is great, and the opportunity to change a young Christian's life is significant.

The scholarship program was created to help stem the exodus of Christians from the Holy Land, which has been driven by economic and political struggles. Many young Christians expressed that if they had the chance to attend college, they would stay and contribute to their community.

Thanks to the generosity of donors, FFHL provides scholarships to Christian students who maintain a B average in high school and come from families facing financial struggles.

FFHL covers up to \$6,000 per year for tuition and books, but students may need to cover additional costs depending on the tuition rates.

Through this program, FFHL is giving young Christians the educational tools they need to build a future in the Holy Land, strengthening the Christian community and helping to prevent further migration. Since its inception, the program has supported over 700 students, with 91% of graduates securing professional jobs. As the program continues to grow, it provides more hope and opportunities for the next generation of leaders in the Holy Land.

HERE'S HOW STUDENTS APPLY FOR THIS LIFE-CHANGING SCHOLARSHIP

STEP 1: CONTACT THE SCHOOL Students interested in applying reach out to their local Christian high school in Israel or the West Bank. Schools send the applications to FFHL.

STEP 2: COMPLETE THE APPLICATION Students fill out the application form, making sure to include all required documents, including their academic transcript (in English). A parent's signature is included on the form to verify the information.

STEP 3: SUBMIT THE APPLICATION All applications must be returned by the end of June each year.

STEP 4: REVIEW AND SELECTION FFHL's selection committee reviews all the applications to ensure applicants meet the criteria. The applications are then sent to four professors in the U.S. who make the final decision based on academic performance and family financial need.

STEP 5: NOTIFICATION By mid-August, students who have been selected for the scholarship are notified by FFHL staff through phone and mail.

STEP 6: SPONSOR MATCHING Once selected, high-performing students are matched with sponsors who support their education. All other scholarship recipients receive funding directly from FFHL.

STEP 7: KEEP IN TOUCH WITH A SPONSOR Students must send a letter or email to their sponsor, thanking them and sharing their academic plans. They'll continue to stay in touch at least once a year with updates on their progress and grades.
